

## How to Search for Built History Outside of Edmonton

To find information on a house in a rural area or small town, begin with a homestead search. This will provide details such as when the land was first settled and point to the first dwelling built on the homesteaded land. Contact or visit the Provincial Archives of Alberta to learn more about how you can use the fee-based service for a homestead search or do this research yourself from home. Many of the pre-1930 homestead applications are available digitally through the website archive.org. Please note that any files on LAC's database (for example, microfilm C-6018) are not available at the Provincial Archives of Alberta, only through LAC.




The Provincial Archives of Alberta (PAA) holds assessment rolls for some towns, counties, municipal districts and improvement districts. Assessment dates and shifts in assessed value can help indicate information such as the date a home was initially built on the property and any new construction that followed. These rolls are typically arranged by legal land description and provide information of the property's ownership and assessed value. Assessment roles for a property can be located by using information such as the municipal district or improvement district at the time the assessment was completed. To determine if the Provincial Archives of Alberta holds records for a specific town, county, municipal district or improvement district, search online through the PAA's online catalogue for the place name. Any available assessment rolls can be accessed in the Sandra Thomson Reading Room during regular hours of retrieval. The level of complexity of each request varies. Consider speaking with an archivist in advance of your visit.

- The Provincial Archives of Alberta Reference Library holds approximately 1,500 published local and community histories from across Alberta. These may include photographs of the community and information on the people who lived there. Published histories can be especially helpful in finding information on a property if the names of the former occupants are known.
- The Provincial Archives of Alberta holds house plans for several communities in Alberta including Camrose, Lamont, Seba Beach, Vegreville and Wetaskiwin. Ask the Reference Desk for assistance with the on-site finding aid.
- The Provincial Archives of Alberta holds Henderson's
   Directories for several cities in Alberta such as
   Edmonton, Calgary, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge, Medicine
   Hat, Camrose and Red Deer. These directories, which were
   published annually, provide information regarding the
   occupant of a house (for example, names, occupations
   and whether the house was owned or rented). These
   directories do not usually list the spouse or children of the
   owner or occupant unless they held paid employment.
- Fire insurance plans were published for various Alberta communities between 1899 and 1972. These plans can provide information on the size of a building, the construction materials and what a building was used for.
